Transcore won the tender and have done a great job transforming the unused land into a great space for everyone.

It has a football pitch (just waiting for the grass to grow literally) it has a wild flower meadow, picnic benches and seating and a bike track. The wildflowers have been selected to attract birds and insects. We held a box-building day, which was a great success. 12 children built bird and bat boxes, insect boxes and hedgehog shelters. All the children involved have their names on the bottom of their box so can see what happens over the next year. We have had comments why there are no swings, this is a garden not a play park. Planning permission was very clear. No dogs are allowed, no fires or litter left behind. If anyone wishes to use the garden the entrance

is through the cul de sac. The gate on Cupids Alley is for emergency access only.

We held an opening event on the 9th September for the community and another event for people who have supported the garden. The Chief Executive for Yorkshire Housing, Mervyn Jones officially opened the garden on the 23rd September, board members and Directors from transcore attended.

Its thanks to people that supported and helped that the garden is a success. Andrea Hustler who started the Dreamscheme project with the children, Chris O'Neil the architect gave his time free, and Clive Smith a tree expert gave his time free. The Transcore staff who did such a great job. A big Thank you to them and their enthusiasm.

Planning and rubbish collection are the mainstay of the Council's business. In both cases there are changes afoot. As part of its stated drive towards 'localism' the Coalition Government has published its proposals for new planning laws. There will be a presumption in favour of development and a significant reduction in 'red tape.' However, whilst applauding the need to drive down bureaucracy, I cannot help but think that this proposed legislation is little more than a developer's charter which, lacking in constraints, may lead to rural landscape blight for generations to come. Councils (and local parishes) will receive central government money (in the form of a New Homes Bonus) in exchange for building (or allowing to be built) new homes on their respective patches. Am I alone in thinking that this is simply a bribe in poor disguise?

On the rubbish collection front, later this month, many of you should be receiving your boxes and bags to enable kerbside plastic and cardboard collection and recycling. This is not before time but welcome nonetheless.

Finally, later this month, we will be considering whether or not to commit a substantial sum of your money to an A64 upgrade at the Brambling Fields Junction in association with the Highways Agency; the aim being to alleviate Malton town centre HGV congestion and promote business enterprise. At the moment, a family of badgers is holding up the work and food trails are being laid in the optimistic hope that they will abandon their present Setts for another. Watch this space!

St Leonard & St Mary's RC Church, Malton

Masses at St Leonard & St Mary's take place at the weekend at 6.30 pm on Saturdays and 9.30 pm on Sundays and various other services are held throughout the week.

Harvest is being celebrated in three different ways by St Leonard & St Mary's RC Church, Malton.

The church's CAFOD Action group held a harvest table after services on the last weekend of September in aid of the international aid agency.

A CAFOD Harvest Fast Day was arranged for October 7/8 while a harvest Festival Mass was being organised at St Mary's RC Primary School for October 20.

The school is also seeking old shirts to be donated for the children to wear while they are painting.

The school, which has 99 pupils, received an "outstanding" report following an Ofsted inspection.

Recent collections at St Leonard & St Mary's RC Church, Malton, raised £1,471.39 for the Xaverian Missionaries and £1,173.14 to help victims of the famine in East Africa through CAFOD, the international aid agency. Both collections will be increased through Gift Aid.

If you have sown a field of barley you would not be expecting to harvest a field of potatoes! So why is it written in the Bible at all? If we just take time to stop and look at everything that is going on around the time of harvest maybe that will throw some light on this simple saying. Churches up and down the Wolds Valley are preparing for their Harvest services and there is a huge amount of work that goes on behind the scenes: making posters, preparing service sheets, decorating the church, gathering the produce, preparing the harvest suppers etc. None of the congregations are huge but when those few people put in all that effort they will reap huge rewards and have some very enjoyable services that everyone is welcome to attend and reap those rewards too! However, all our efforts in the churches pale in comparison to amazing work that has been going on around us in the fields up and down this valley. Enormous fields of waving corn one day are harvested overnight, baled the next day and the following day (or so it seems to the bystander) are ploughed and planted ready for the next crop. The barns are now full and we can be thankful for another harvest but it would not have happened without such incredible stamina and determination from those who have been out in the fields day and night. Apart from the seeds, they have also "sown" time, energy, determination, skill, patience etc. which is an integral part of the harvest.

Perhaps their example will help us as we think through the things in our life that we long for: a better relationship, a different job, a healthier life etc. and consider what we need to "sow" now in order that we can "reap" those things later.

NO BATS IN OUR BELFRY!



Various people have suggested

over the last year or so that there may be bats in St Andrews, Weaverthorpe. We were contacted recently by the Bridlington Bat Group who kindly offered to come and survey the Church and the churchyard. As many of you will know roosting bats in any building can cause huge problems for users of that building so we were very relieved to find that although bats do fly around in our church, they are small in number and do not roost in the building. Bats like to find a safe place to fly around for a while occasionally. Apparently you can tell if you have bats because if you squash the droppings, mice droppings just squash but bat droppings disintegrate – bet you're glad you know that. Several bats were spotted in the churchyard as darkness fell, common pipistrelles, and the Bridlington Bat Group have offered to come back again next summer to have another look at what is going on in the bat world.
