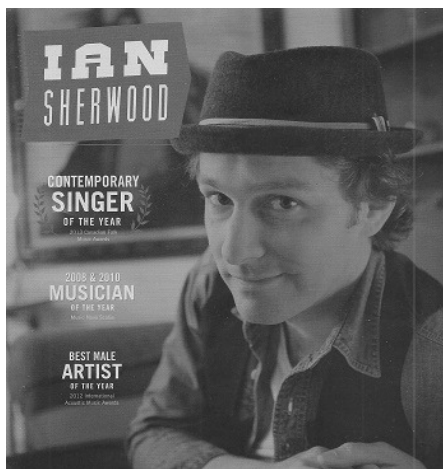

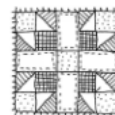

Weaverthorpe Parish Council

HGV parking in Weaverthorpe.

Over the past few years overnight parking of HGV's in Weaverthorpe has become a problem, restricting access for parking to the village hall and blocking other accesses in the village, and in some cases accompanied by anti social behaviour by the drivers of these vehicles. Not all of the HGVs are on their way to or from Velco.

Weaverthorpe Parish Council has been in discussion with NYCC Highways for over two years to try and get a solution to the problem. We are pleased to inform residents that we now have permission to plant a hedge across the layby opposite the village hall, which will restrict access to HGV's whilst still allowing smaller vehicles to park at right angles to the road for village hall events and still allow the mobile library to park there.

The cost of the hedge and some fencing to protect the hedge whilst it matures has been met by a grant, so no direct taxpayers money is being spent on this project. You may see the fence erected first as we cannot plant a hedge until the autumn. The work is being carried out by the Parish Councilors on a voluntary basis.

Additionally, Velco have agreed to place some signs outside of their premises in Roper Lane to inform drivers that they cannot park there overnight as has been the case in the past.

The Parish Council believes that this will solve the problem that we have been experiencing.

If, however we do get any HGVs still parking in the village, an idea that came out of our discussions with Velco was that we set up an email list. If an HGV parks in the village, we can identify the owner (in most cases) by the livery and get as many people as possible to send an email to the owners to point out that HGV parking is not appropriate in our village and that there is a adequate parking on the A64. A number of emails would be more effective than one email from the Parish Council. If you would be willing to add your email to the list, please let us know at weaverthorpeparishcouncil@gmail.com or contact the Clerk, details below.

We have not worked out the final detail but we would see this working, by someone notifying a member of the Parish Council that there is an HGV parked in the Village, then we would identify the owner, and the Parish Council would send everyone on the list the text of an email, so that those on the list can send an email to the owner.

Parking in Weaverthorpe.

At our recent Parish Council meeting concerns were raised on behalf of residents about small vehicle parking in the village. In particular parking on pavements and adjacent to the junction of Sherburn Road and Main Road.

The Parish Council requests that you do not park on pavements, either wholly or partially. The Highway Code is quite clear on this subject that parking on the pavement can obstruct and seriously inconvenience pedestrians, people in wheel chairs or with visual impairments and people with prams or pushchairs. Most of the parking on the pavements is on the north side of Main Road, which is the route that parents with children at the School take.

Additionally parking on the corners of the junction of the Sherburn Road (Back Lane) and Main Road, seriously impairs the visibility of drivers pulling out onto Main Road. Again the Highway Code is quite clear on this and states that you do not park near a school entrance or within 10 metres (32 feet) of a junction.

The Parish Council requests that those residents who do contravene the rules in the Highway Code, please reconsider their parking to adhere to the rules in future.

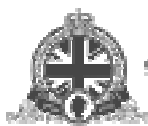
